SEMICOLONS:

A Shabbat Message from Rabbi Dr. Jeffrey Kobrin

True confession: I've been a grammar nerd for years. I am one of those elitists who enjoys dissecting the various parts of speech; who gets annoyed when others use commas incorrectly; and who geeks out reading an article on semicolons. I think one of the aspects of grammar that appeals to me is the sense that it offers a set of rules with clear meaning and purpose, rules that have to be studied but which ultimately make sense.



This week's Torah reading of Mishpatim similarly offers a long list of rules that have meaning and purpose. The thirteenth-century Chizkuni notes that these dinim, these laws, immediately follow the story of the Aseret HaDibrot, the Ten Commandments, because God first wanted to teach the people yir'ah, or awe, and could then begin to teach them logic. The mitzvot make sense -- certainly the rational ones in this parasha -- but they are built on a foundation of an emotional relationship with Hashem.

Ramban notes that these laws provide a structure for the entire world. He cites the Midrash which says kol haTorah teluya be-mishpat, "the whole Torah depends on justice." Without justice, he explains, we would slip into anarchy. This is why these laws are called mishpatim. They make sense, and they serve to provide us with meaning, structure and protection.

But unlike the rules of grammar, the Torah's laws have an additional feature. Rabbi Yosef Dov Soloveichik, the nineteenth-century sage (and great-grandfather of Rabbi Joseph B. Soloveitchik) writes in his magnificent Beit HaLevi that we must study the mitzvot not only to know what to do and what not to do; we have an additional commandment of limud Torah, of studying Torah for its own sake. This is why, he famously explains, at the end of the parasha the people told Moshe na'aseh ve-nishma, "we will do and we will listen." They would learn enough to know what to do, and then they would keep learning beyond that, they would keep "listening" -- just because it was Torah.

In a period of our lives when we seem to be drowning in rules, rules which often change, rules which to many of us (as so many of you tell me when you call and email me) seem unclear as to their meaning and purpose, it can give us strength to remember that these various rules and guidelines will ultimately fade away.

God's rules, however, will always be there, and will always make good sense. Just like semicolons.

DVAR TORAH: PARSHAT MISHPATIM

Parashat Mishpatim contains many mitzvot, most of them ben adam lachavero (between fellow Jews). One of these mitzvot, that of lending money to a poor person, is the one that I would like to focus on.

The verse states: "אם קסף תלוה את עמי את העני עמך...לא תשימון עליו נשך" - "If you lend money to my nation, to the poor among you...exact no interest from them." Our rabbis explain that the use of seemingly repetitive language (my people, the poor among you) is to communicate the need for an added level of empathy and sensitivity towards the poor and towards all Jews in need. Rashi points out that the word ami (my nation) challenges us to relate to poor people with compassion and identify with them since they are also Hashem's children.

Rashi expands upon this idea by looking at the next part of the pasuk: "את העני עמך" - the poor among you". According to Rashi, this phrase is included in the pasuk to teach us not only to be sensitive to the poor but to view ourselves as no better than they are. If you are the donor, and he is the recipient, he is among you, on your level. Lending someone a helping hand does not mean that you are superior.

A similar idea can be found in the thinking of the Or Hachayim Hakadosh, who offers an additional explanation for the words "את העני עמך". He senses that the Torah is telling the rich man that his money was given to him to share with those in need and thus enabling him to perform the mitzvah of tzedaka. Therefore, the money that the rich



man is giving the poor already belongs to the poor man, thus he is “among” you.

In conclusion, the Torah is training us to view the mitzvah of tzedaka as an expected and humanitarian act. It teaches us that in the eyes of God we are all equal, and that the blessings in our lives were given to us to be shared with others with kindness and mindfulness. Shabbat Shalom

SPOTLIGHT ON: MUSIC!

Grades Toddler-3 by Mr. Izzy Kieffer

With Purim just around the corner, all of our students in grades Toddler-3 are busy brushing up on and learning new songs to celebrate the holiday. Singing is such an important way of building Jewish identity. We're sure that some of the songs our children still learn today were also some of our parent and grandparent favorites growing up.

In Early Childhood, we had a busy few weeks preparing for our Chanukah and Tu B'shvat winter Zoom invites for Nursery and Kindergarten. Some of our upcoming classroom Zoom invites will celebrate Purim, Shabbat, Books and Reading as well as the story of Yosef and his brothers.

It's an exciting time for our grade 1-3 students who are learning how to read music.

We start off simply by learning notes and will eventually translate this into musical instruments God willing when we can resume our recorders after COVID. In 2nd and 3rd grade our students are already familiar with 16 notes!

Our 1st and 2nd grade students are also busy preparing for their Siddur and Chumash celebrations which will God willing take place in the Spring.

Grades 3-8 by Mrs. Marcelline Yellin

My 3rd grade class and all 4th and 5th grade classes have enjoyed a totally different music curriculum due to the pandemic. It is great to see how even though things look a bit different, we can still truly soak up the joy of music.

We start with some body percussion (rhythms tapped on different parts of the body) that we then pass around the class while keeping the beat. It works as a concentration game as well. Our students seem to love it; the harder the pattern, the more they enjoy the challenge.

First, I present a short YouTube video on music history or notation. This gives a wide variety of work, gets the blood flowing, and provides new information in a game format.

When we meet on Zoom during remote learning, our sessions are much more oriented to the historical aspects of music history or performance. Examples from last week: Beethoven's 5th symphony is presented as a cartoon, then viewed being played by an orchestra (conductor's role being focused on) and then analyzed by watching a graphic animation that points out the repeated four note motif over 200 times throughout the first movement. Students try to count the first 67 times but Beethoven is faster than their pencils.

I have loved joining our second graders and Mr. Kieffer who are meeting in the auditorium in small groups that are socially distanced, in order to add some movements to their Chumash songs which they are practicing for their upcoming Spring celebration. We know the Chagigat HaChumash will be both beautiful and meaningful!

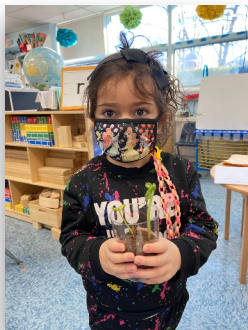
We are also preparing for a school wide musical video that's in the works by singing our two Hebrew songs during music classes.

Old Mill children are learning to tune and play songs on their ukuleles. We now know the most common chords (C, G, A minor and F). These four chords will enable us to play hundreds of songs! We have learned : Od Yavo Shalom Aleinu, You are my Sunshine, Happy Birthday, I Have a Little Dreidel, Maoz Tsur, Rip Tide and I'm Yours. The gift of this little instrument means our children can be active participants in music making, not just laid back listeners.

PreK is busy as usual. The week before our January break we learned about Tu B'shvat and the birthday of the trees. In Eretz Yisrael the climate is a bit different and the trees, specifically the almond trees, start to blossom around the time of Tu B'shvat. Of course, trees don't actually celebrate birthdays but, it gave us the opportunity to learn more about the cycle of the trees, and all of the many things we get from trees. We will remember the miracle that the Jewish people were saved from the wicked Haman and we will hear Parshat Zachor. We will even compare a Torah and Megillah. 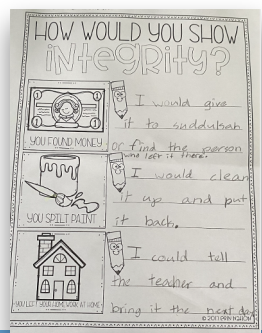
In other exciting EdTech news, our families and teachers in grades 1-3 are now using Seesaw which is a digital platform that streamlines accessing, submitting and reviewing classwork and homework assignments. Seesaw is especially important during periods of remote learning or when a student is absent from school. Through the easy to use apps, students or parents can easily upload and access assignments which teachers can then view, markup or comment upon. We hope our parents have found it to enhance their family's experiences and we look forward to hearing any feedback they might have.

SPOTLIGHT ON: SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING (SEL)

Students in grades PreK-2nd started a new unit in which they will learn to set goals, both personal and in the classroom, and create a plan with action steps. Students were introduced to goals by watching a short video clip on Goal Setting, then brainstorming different types of goals. Students learned that goals should challenge them, but it shouldn't be TOO hard. Goals should be realistic, which means it is very possible for us to reach them with hard work!

In grades 3 through 5, students discussed the connection between achieving goals and perseverance. Students then watched a TedxYouth Talk about perseverance. Students were encouraged to think about their own goals and what they can do to persevere through challenges and achieve them. Students were also introduced to the topic of

integrity and learned about the importance of integrity and acting with kindness, honesty, and fairness. They reflected on their own integrity and defined what integrity looks like and sounds like.
